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Call for Lifeguard Applications 2013 Season

The Forest Ridge Association is accepting applications for lifeguards and Recreation Supervisors for the 2012 season. Those interested must have current Lifeguard training, Standard First Aid, and CPR for the Professional Rescuer. Those with old Lifeguard Training will be required to update when the pool opens. WSI certification is recommended for consideration but not required for the available positions. Applications should be in résumé form and must include copies of the front and back of all certifications. The résumé should include any experience with young children, school, and community activities. Also include 2 written references from former employers, teachers, or community leaders. Previous employees of FRA do not need to submit references. The staff is responsible for helping with the opening of the pool and must be available to work on weekends during May (possible exceptions if away at school). You must also include your swimsuit and shirt size, date you can start full-time, all dates you must have off, and when you return to school.

Each year of experience means one season consisting of at least eight full weeks. For example, if an individual was hired prior to June 30 and works through Labor Day, the individual will be paid the next step the next year. If the individual is hired after July 1, the individual will be paid the same step for the entire next year. Prior experience at another pool, regardless of the number of years, will qualify the individual for a Step 2 if it can be verified that the individual has at least one full year of experience.

Residents of Forest Ridge receive preference for these positions, assuming they are otherwise qualified. WSI qualified applicants are preferred.

¹Lifeguard certifications must be current at all times. It is the responsibility of each employee to provide such certification to the Recreation Area Manager. The base rate will be effective from the date the manager receives the certification, not retroactive to the date of the certification. If the Manager does not have a current lifeguard certification on file, the employee will be paid \$3.95/hour until such certification is provided.

²Current WSI certificates must be provided to the Recreation Area Manager in order to receive this rate. Once the WSI certification expires, the individual will be paid at the base rate until a current WSI certificate is again provided to the Recreation Area Manager. The WSI rate is effective on the date the Recreation Area Manager receives the current certificate, not retroactive to the effective date of the certificate.

Copper thefts are on the rise. The people committing these crimes seem to be targeting unoccupied properties up for sale now. In the past these crimes were being committed on homes that were reprocessed and vacant for long periods of time. One of the most common things taken is/are the heat pumps.

So, you may think this doesn't apply to me, my house isn't for sale. Well it affects all of us. Last year we had a house in the neighborhood that copper thieves hit. The bank didn't figure this out until they had a buyer for the property. The theft set the sale of the property back now over a year. It is still empty today because of this. I think it is working on three years now, maybe longer, this property has been vacant. The property has been a serious eyesore, with grass and weeds knee to hip high. I have been told the property has been used for pot parties and by homeless people. This hurts everyone because it devalues all of our homes.

Local home owners that live near these homes find it hard to sell their homes. The copper roof on the Forest Ridge Sign was taken a few years back. They didn't replace it because of the expense and there was no way to prevent another theft.

I am finding a number of heat pump thefts. These are very easy to take. All the thief has to do is cut the copper tubing and the electric wiring and carry the heat pump away.

So what do we do? Identify these homes in your neighborhood. I am told there are many vacant homes in the region. Once identified, watch these properties like a hawk. These crimes are almost always committed at night.

These thieves are a special breed. These are different from your normal home burglary thief. First of all they have to bring in equipment to tear out the copper and cut it. So basically they have to haul in a hammer, a saw or something that will cut the pipe. Since they do it in the cover of darkness, I am thinking they use some sort of small light. Look for lights in deserted houses at night. These thieves stay nearly invisible so it may not be possible to actually see them coming and/or going.

So if you see adults with a back pack or bag, be suspicious. If there are foot tracks, (like in the snow going into a vacant property), ask the police to check it out. It is not likely they will be backing a truck up the drive way to these houses. They are going to park a street or two away. Maybe they would park in front of one of our green areas and walk in. In many instances they cut the piping up in small pieces and carry it out in some sort of long bag, such as a duffle bag or a sea bag.

The most common way they are caught in the act is when a neighbor alerts law enforcement complaining of power equipment noises coming from the property late at night. So if you see what looks like someone using a flashlight, or hear power tool noises in a home that is vacant, or not occupied, you should alert law enforcement.

One final note on this. When you're reporting this type of crime, be sure to mention to the dispatcher that you suspect this is copper theft. This is one of the instances law enforcement will want to sneak up on.

Avoid Home Improvement Scams

"With Spring Comes Scams"

MARCH 2013

Home Improvement scams can happen when a person or company is paid up front for work they may have no intention of doing. They may offer false promises and disappear without doing any work or after doing only a partial or poor job.

To avoid these scams:

- Always obtain at least three estimates.
- Get any agreement on work to be done and the price in writing.
- Check references.
- Don't hire someone who is down on their luck or looking for side jobs when you do not know them personally.
- Do not pay cash up front. Never give more than 1/3 of the cost as your down payment.
- Never finance through the contractor without getting comparison loan rates.
- Do not let the contractor rush your decision. Be wary of "today only" prices.
- Check with the Better Business Bureau for comments or complaints about the contractor you are interested in.
- Beware of free home energy audits that come from companies other than your utility company.

Remember: Under Federal law, contractors who sell door-to-door are required to allow you to cancel within three business days prior to beginning any work.

The above ALERT is part of the Montgomery County Prosecuting Attorney's initiative to help citizens become aware of ways they can avoid becoming a victim, or ways they can help stop criminal activity that may be occurring. 

From The OHIO BMV Motor Scooter Information

REMINDER OF OHIO'S MOTOR SCOOTER LAWS

Motor scooters and mini-motorcycles have become hot items among children and teenagers.

Parents, grandparents and other family members are spending their hard earned money to purchase scooters and mini-motorcycles – just to find out that most cannot be operated on Ohio's roads and their children - or grandchildren cannot legally operate the vehicle.

In Ohio, the motor scooters and mini-motorcycles cannot be legally operated on Ohio's roadways unless - they are titled, registered, covered by the proper insurance and the operator is at least 16 years old with a motorcycle license or endorsement on his or her driver license.

Most of the small electric and gas powered motor scooters, which are sold in sporting good stores and department stores, are not roadworthy, therefore cannot be titled or registered.

In order for the scooter or the mini-motorcycle to be considered roadworthy each must contain a seat, not more than three wheels in contact with the ground, contain the proper brake lights, turn signals, horn, rearview mirrors and headlights.

The county title office will then issue a title for your motor scooter or mini-motorcycle. The title will cost \$5.

After you purchase your title, you will need to register your vehicle. The annual registration costs \$28.50, plus a permissive tax if required and any new plate fees.

The motor scooter and mini-motorcycle will be issued a motorcycle plate, which will need to be attached to the vehicle.

Please make sure you have the proper insurance coverage on your motor scooter or mini-motorcycle, before registering your vehicle. The owner and the operator of the motor scooter or mini-motorcycle are subject to financial responsibility suspensions if the proper insurance is not maintained.

And finally, in order for the individual to legally operate the motor scooter or mini-motorcycle – he or she must be at least 16 years old and hold a valid driver license with a motorcycle endorsement or a motorcycle license. It is very important to know Ohio's road laws and signs before an individual attempts to operate a vehicle of any kind on Ohio's roadways. Licensed drivers have been tested on their knowledge and skills.

Please, know the law before you purchase a motor scooter or a mini-motorcycle. Know where they may be operated and who can operate them. If you have questions you may contact the BMV at 614-752-7800 and you also need to check with your local jurisdiction before you make the purchase.

It's about your safety, your children's safety and other drivers' safety.
